St. Stephen's Human Services



History:

1960s: Members of St. Stephen's Church began offering programs for the poor and homeless.

Early 1980s: The church, along with ten other Minneapolis churches, opened shelters. Believed to be temporary measures to a temporary crisis.

1991: St. Stephen's launched Alliance Housing, a nonprofit affordable housing developer.

2002: St. Stephen's Human Services obtained nonprofit status independent of the church.

Today: We remain an independent nonprofit agency grounded in the social justice teachings on which we were founded.

We provide emergency assistance, shelter, housing, and advocacy focused on systems change.

Serving: Single Adults, Families, Veterans

Emergency Services: Street Outreach, 2 Shelters

Housing Services: Housing First Programs, Rapid Re-housing, Homeless Prevention

Education & Advocacy: A Day in the Life, zAmya Theater Project

Supportive Services for Veteran Families: Outreach & Engagement, Prevention, Rapid Re-housing

We envision a community in which housing instability is rare, brief and non-recurring, ending homelessness as we know it.

Our Values:

Equity: Housing is a basic human right.

Self-Determination: Each person has the ability to know and realize their own success.

Harm Reduction Principles

- Decision to use is accepted
- Individual is treated with dignity & has a voice
- Individual expected to take responsibility for their own behavior
- Reducing harm, not consumption
- No pre-defined outcomes

Housing First:



People experiencing homelessness are offered permanent housing with few to no treatment preconditions, behavioral contingencies, or barriers.

Housing First:

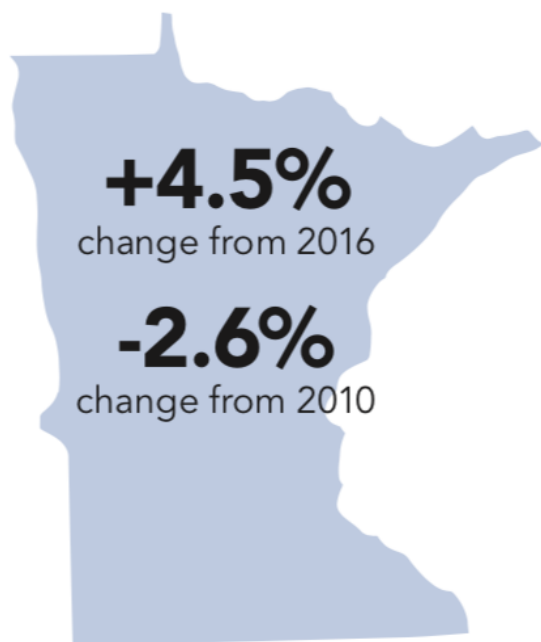


- Immediate access to housing
 - Funds to do so available
- House most vulnerable first
- Separation of housing & services
- Trauma-informed care
- Client choice & client driven
- Fidelity to HF standards

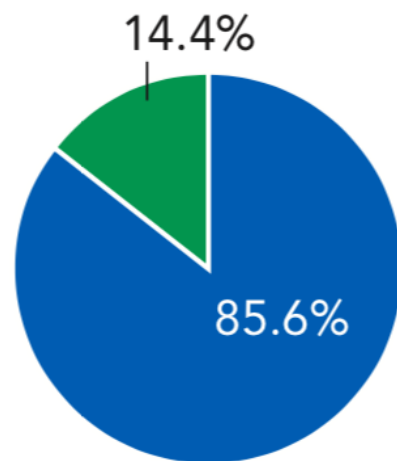

NATIONWIDE - HOW MANY VETERANS EXPERIENCE HOMELESSNESS?

- ▶ 40,056 veterans (approximately 9% of all homeless adults)
- ▶ Most were without children; only 2% (955) were homeless as part of a family
- ▶ 91% were men - 9% (3,571 veterans) were women

Veteran Homelessness in Minnesota



- 281 Veteran's Experiencing Homelessness Statewide
- 110 Homeless Veterans in Minneapolis (Hennepin County) CoC
 - 3 were unsheltered

Veteran Homelessness - Minnesota



- Average age is 51.
- A decade older than average age of overall homeless adult population.
- Chronic homelessness: 6 out of 10 homeless Veterans without stable housing for a year or longer.
- 1 out of 3 homeless at least 3 years.

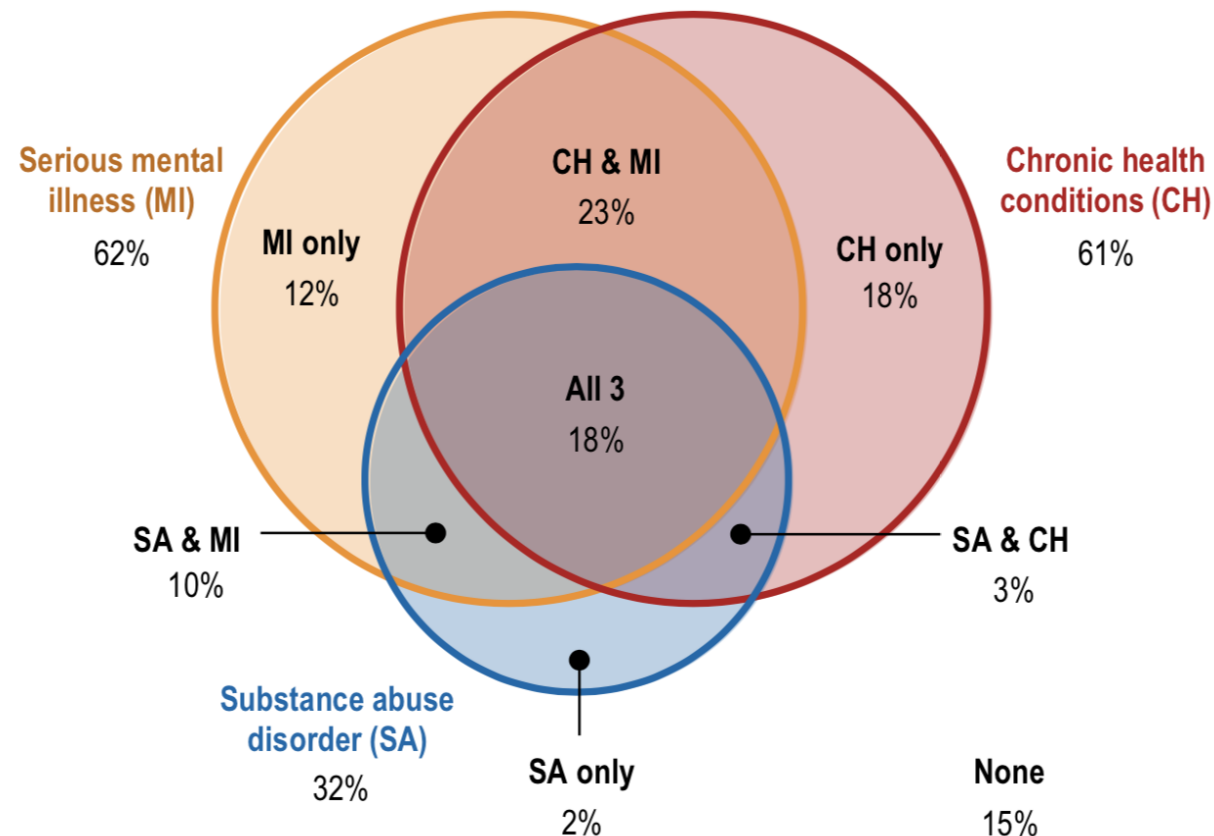
Increased Barriers

- “Combat exposure has been found to increase risk for PTSD in veterans, which, in turn, is thought to increase risk for homelessness.” (Carlson et al., 2013)
- 30% of homeless Veterans reported they served in a combat zone (Wilder Study)
- 45% reported a service-related health problem (45% of these reported a service-related mental health problem) (Wilder Study)

Incidence & co-occurrence of health conditions among Minnesota homeless Veterans



Proportion with no barriers: 15%
Proportion with multiple barriers: 53%



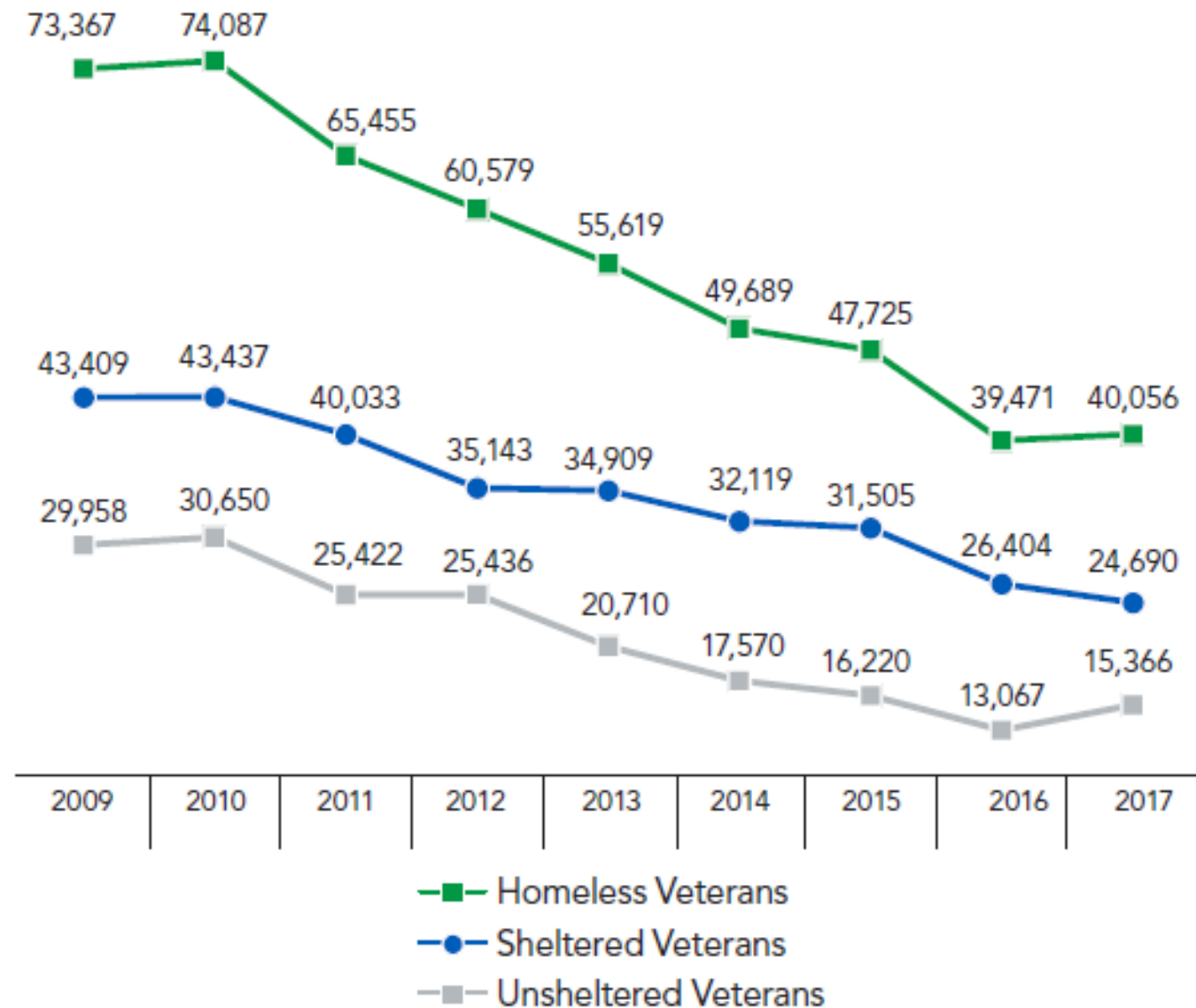

EXHIBIT 5.1: PIT Estimates of Homeless Veterans By Sheltered Status, 2009–2017



Downward Trends in Minnesota:

Veteran homelessness has decreased by 56% since 2010, compared with a 46% reduction across the country.



"Since the Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs launched the Minnesota Homeless Veteran Registry in 2014, it has housed 1,218 homeless veterans – 613 in Hennepin County. Minneapolis* and Hennepin County have the highest concentration of homeless veterans in the state."



*Numbers of homeless veterans in Minneapolis are not tracked, but it is estimated that most of the homeless veterans in Hennepin County are in Minneapolis

2017: 3 Unsheltered (2 Chronic)

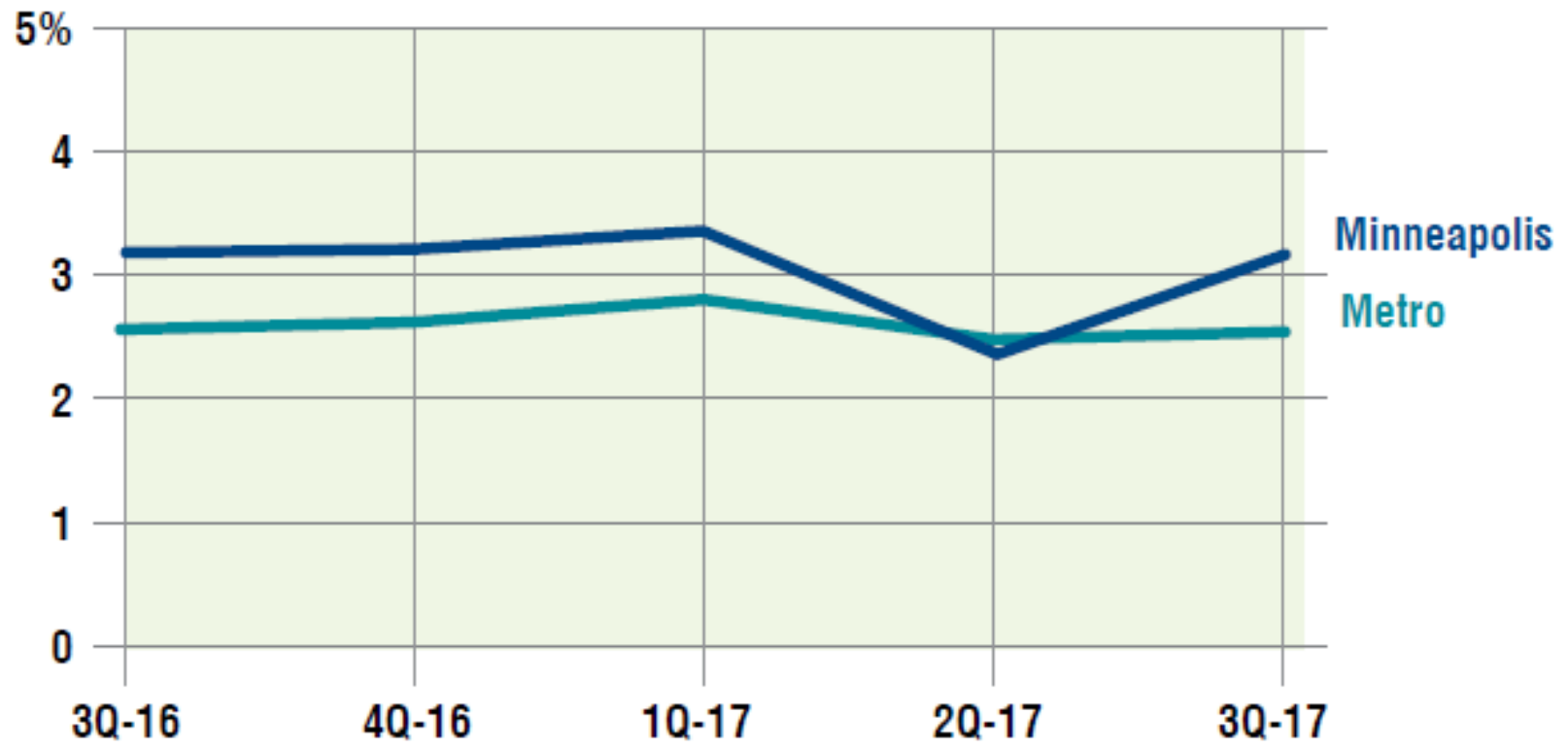
2016: 11 Unsheltered

in percent

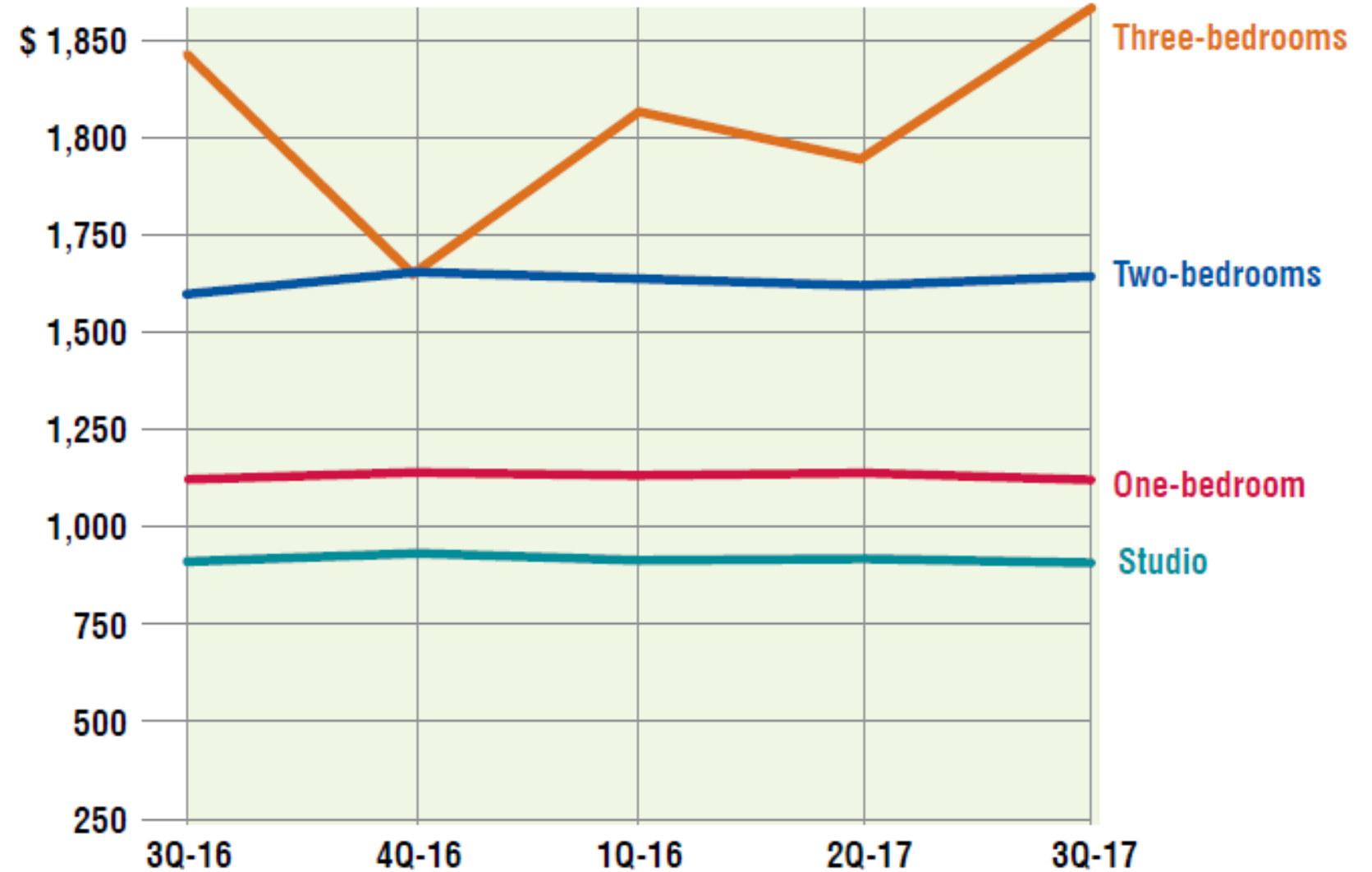

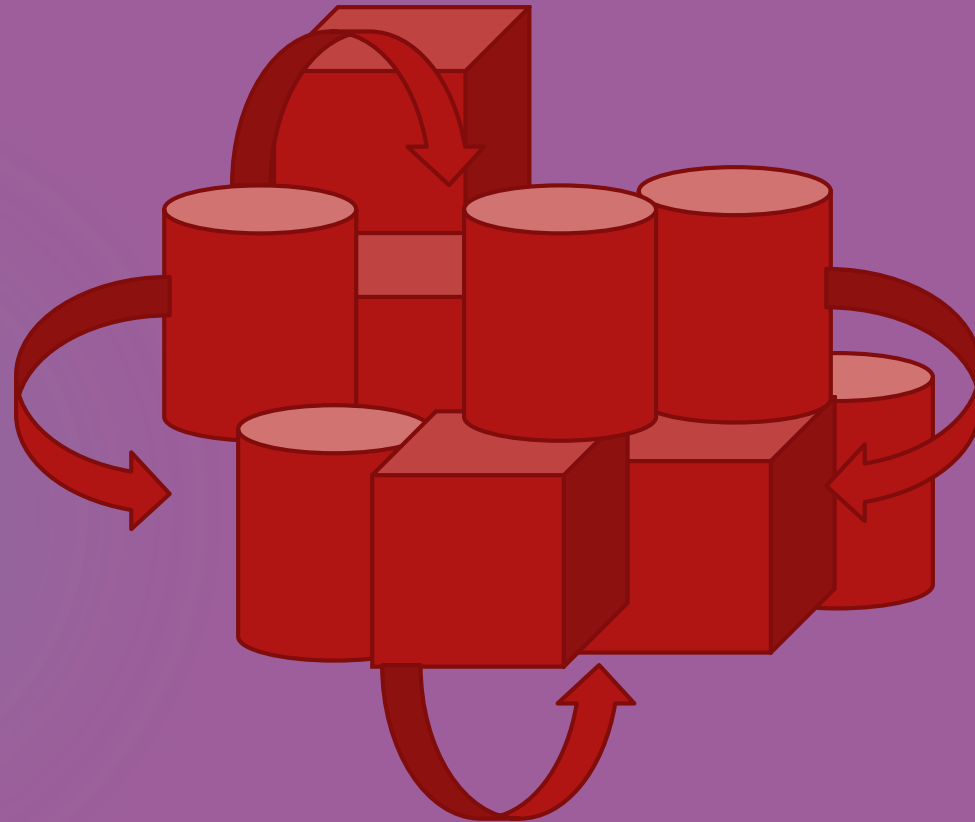

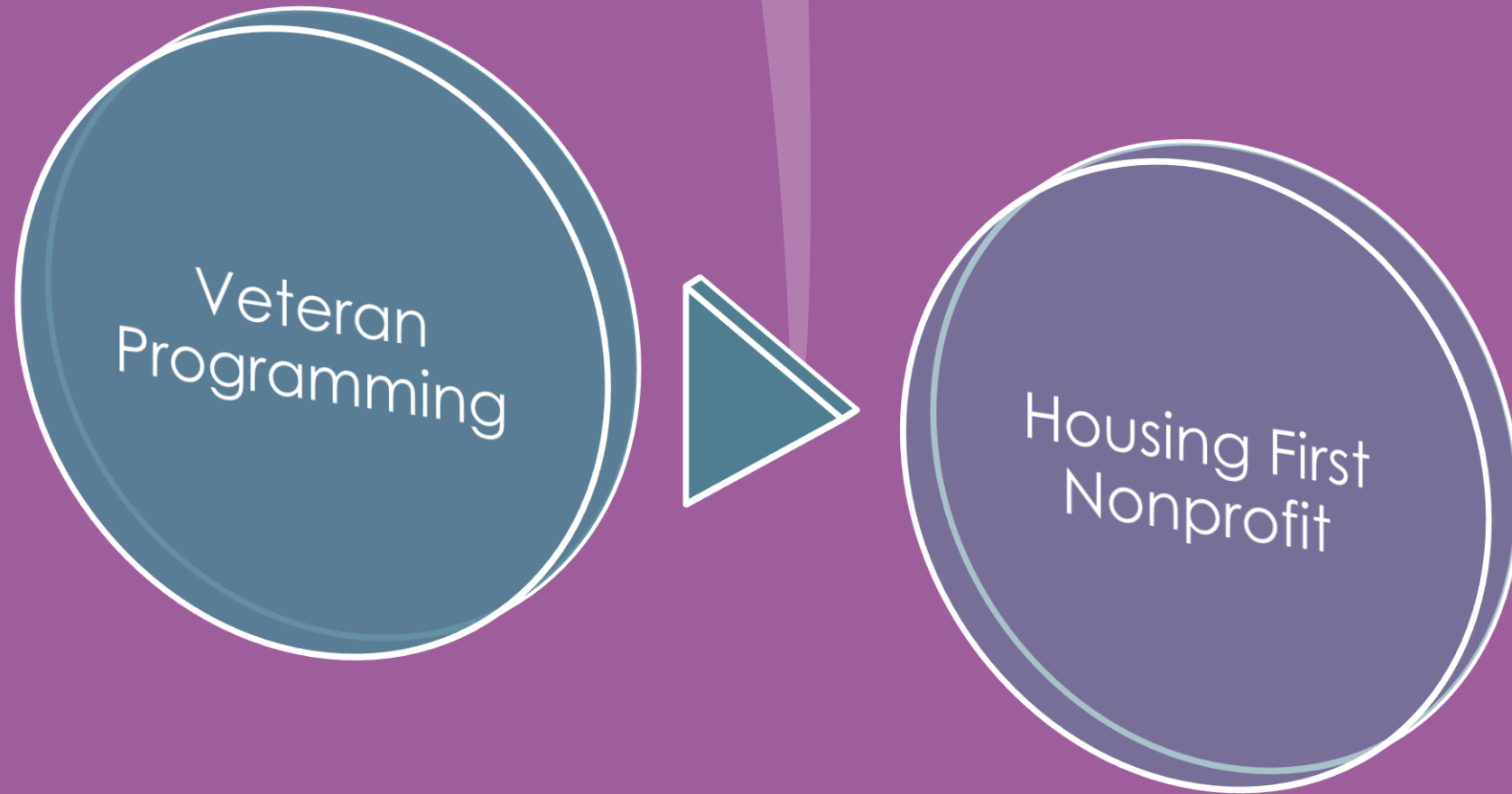

Building a Program



Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)



Services Provided 2017:



- 253 Total Veterans served
- 54 Veterans in Rapid Rehousing
 - 76% obtained housing
 - 52 days: Average time to obtain housing
 - 73% housed in 90 days
- 37 Veterans assisted by Prevention Program

Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans (MACV)



501 (c)(3) nonprofit organization assisting veterans for over 25 years.

MISSION: Ending Veteran homelessness in Minnesota

VISION: To provide assistance throughout Minnesota to **positively motivated veterans** and their families who are homeless or experiencing other life crises. MACV accomplishes its mission by providing services directly **or in collaboration with other service agencies.**

Structuring a Program:

Challenges:

Conflation of roles

No primary point of contact (Military structure)

Strategies:

Clearly-defined roles

Process clarity – clear handoffs

Management structure



Leveraging: Wrap-Around Services & Supports

Services within the Agency

Collaboration with:



- ▶ Housing location team
 - ▶ Case managers focus on case management
- ▶ In-house representative payees

External Wrap-Around Services Non-Veteran



- ❖ Bridging: Furniture & Homewares
- ❖ Health Care for the Homeless
- ❖ PCAs
- ❖ County Services (CADI, Front Door, DART)
- ❖ Community Clinics
- ❖ Community Action Partnership of Hennepin County
- ❖ Other nonprofits providing support services
- ❖ Domestic Violence Resources
- ❖ Chemical Health Providers
- ❖ Food Shelves

Veteran-Specific Services



- ▶ MACV Job Club
- ▶ SOAR Advocates
- ▶ LSS CORE (Luther Social Services Counseling & Case Management, Outreach, Referral, & Education)
- ▶ VA Partnerships
- ▶ Minneapolis VA Community Resource & Referral Center (CRRC)

Additional Veteran Services

- ▶ Local VFW Posts
- ▶ Minnesota Homeless Veteran Registry
 - ▶ Parallel to Coordinated Entry System



Other Veteran Options



Grant & Per Diem Program (GPD): Time-Limited Transitional Housing with Permanent Housing as a primary outcome goal

- 3 Models: Bridge Housing, Service-Intensive Transitional Housing, Transition-in-Place

HUD-VASH: collaborative program - HUD housing vouchers with VA supportive services. Helps veterans & families find & sustain permanent housing.

MACV & Surrounding Veteran Services

- ✓ Byzantine & Hierarchical Structures
- ✓ Staff with lengthy military backgrounds



Limited Tool Kit:

Rapid Re-housing often not best fit

Decrease in veteran homelessness =
more high-barrier veterans



Changing Program Requirements

- VA Eligibility
- Discharge status (BCD)
- Subject to interpretation
- Who is the decision maker?

Funding Structure Challenges

- ▶ Program Contract Renewals
 - ▶ = Program Instability
- ▶ Deposit & Monthly Rent Requests
 - ▶ = Conflicts with Housing First



Strategies: Keeping Housing First – First!



- ▶ Veteran choice at the forefront
- ▶ Educate & advocate with MACV
- ▶ Contingency planning: alternative options if SSVF does not work
- ▶ Open channels of communication within agency team
 - ▶ Supervision & team meetings to discuss challenges
 - ▶ Discussing barriers
- ▶ ALWAYS using Housing First & Harm Reduction Lens
 - ▶ Push back from this perspective
 - ▶ Support client from this perspective

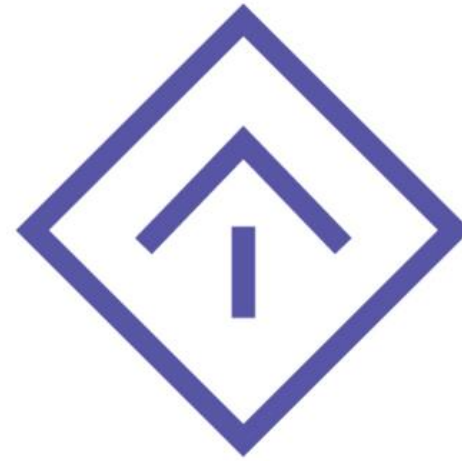
