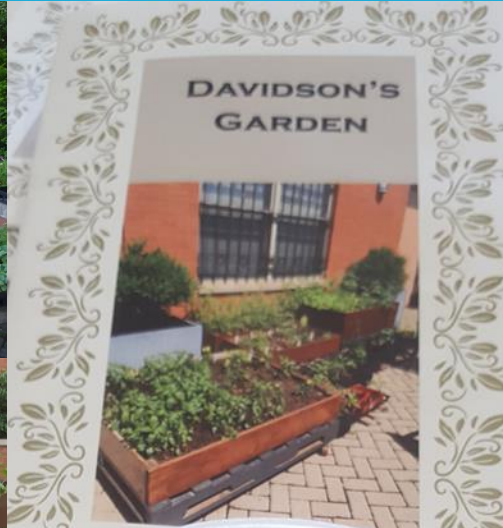

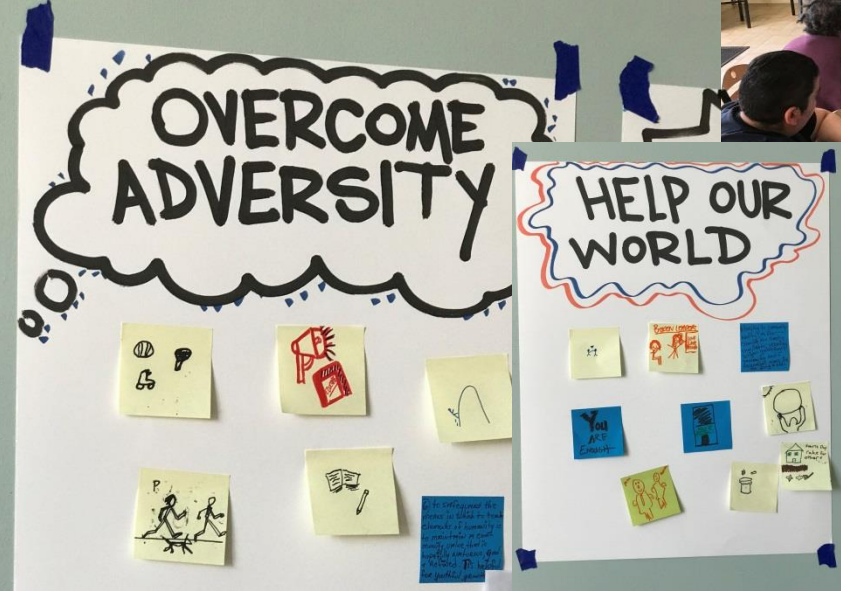

- Diversity – social complexity

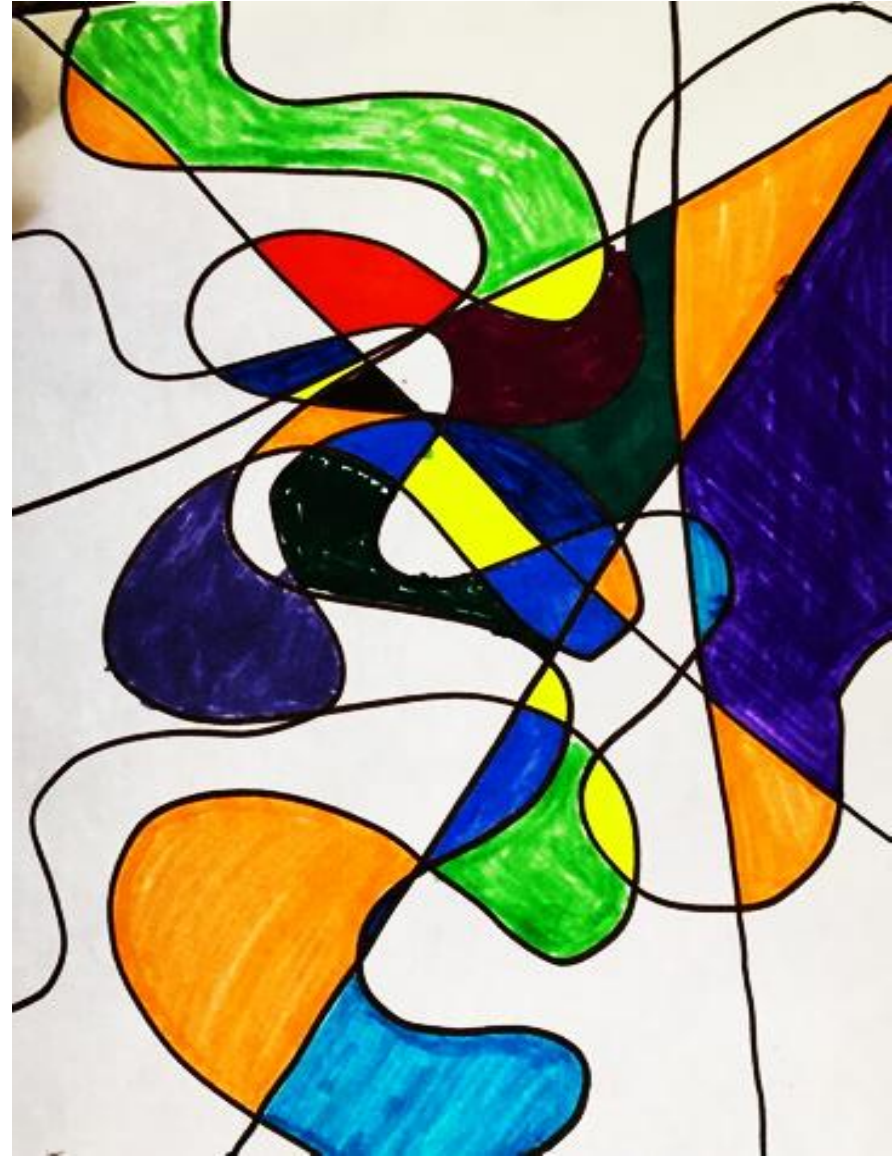
The more complex the goal, the more **dense and robust** the community needs to be. The more complex the goal the **higher the trust** within the community needs to be.

Core

- Personalize
- Identify interests/skills
- Present quality
- Facilitate vs. teach
- Build rapport
- Be flexible
- Follow-up
- Maintain consistency
- Offer vs. require
- Stay accountable
- Engage with food



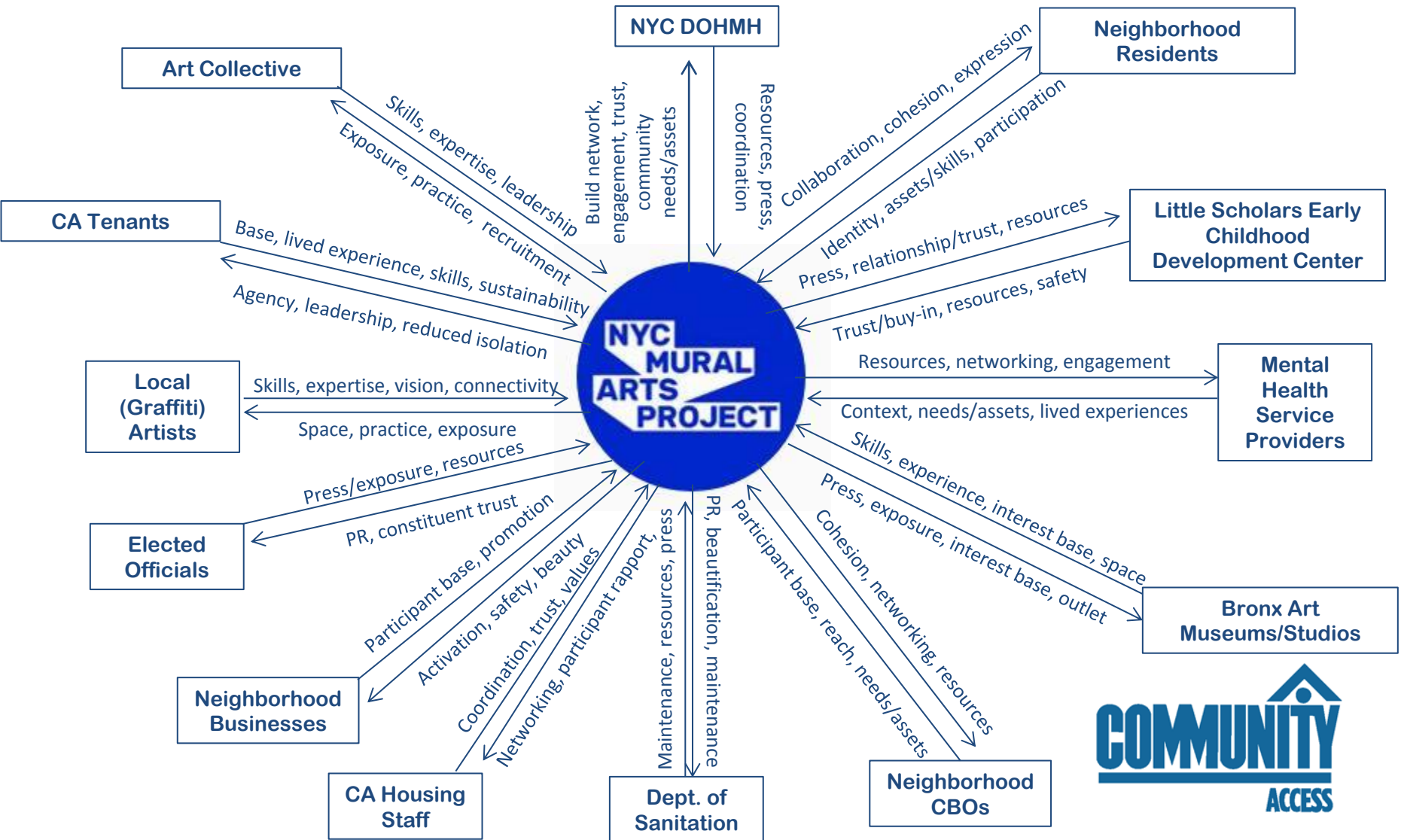
Strategies for Community Building

Peripheral

- Hold to agency principles
- Identify needs & assets
- Build rapport with:
 - Local businesses
 - Community board
 - Elected officials
- Follow-up
- Accountability

Strategies to Leverage Expertise

- Affirm lived experience
- Honor the whole person
- Identify interests, expertise, skills
- Customize (person-centered, site-specific)
- Train the trainer (popular education)
- Create platform for leadership
- Peer-to-peer
- Staff flexibility
- Document and celebrate the work
