

# Shelter Diversion 101

Low-cost housing first intervention to prevent homelessness at the front door

## What is Diversion?



## **Philosophy**

Diversion is based on the belief that clients have a **right to housing**, and the **ability to maintain housing**.

Homelessness is a crisis. Not who someone is.





Interventions can realign incentives & change the dynamic to house people faster and more permanently.

Diversion is part of a "Harm Reduction" Approach

#### What is Shelter Diversion?

Diversion is an intervention to solve individuals or families lack of housing before they have entered shelter or street homelessness

Through a conflict resolution, empowerment based approach, providers can prevent episodes of homelessness before they begin.

#### **Definitions:**

Because Diversion fits into so many housing service systems differently, there is no standardized definition.

It is a common set of principles that guide a meditation style of intervention used at the point at which someone has just become homeless, but has not yet entered shelter.

#### **Definitions:**

Cleveland Mediation Center Definition of Diversion: Diversion is empowering persons facing imminent homelessness to identify safe and appropriate housing options and assisting them in avoiding shelter and returning immediately to housing.

### **Diversion** is:

Crisis Intervention through Empowerment

Housing Intervention before clients enter Shelter

Person-Centered Approach to resolving homelessness

Low-cost, lightest touch intervention.

Never a barrier to entering shelter

## Why Divert?

Emergency Shelters should be just that, For Emergencies

Episodes of Homelessness should be **Brief** 

Resources should be Prioritized for the Most Vulnerable

Shelters aren't Homes

Homelessness is Solvable





## YES

Many communities and states are implementing incredibly effective Shelter Diversion programs!

In a 2015 case study in New London, CT, 80% of families were diverted.





From Jan - July 2017, CT diverted 17% of those presenting for shelter & some regions are diverting as high as 40%.

## But how much did it cost?

The average cost in the 2015 New London case study was \$1,750 per home. Only one-third of family diversions needed financial assistance.

In Fairfield County CT, it costs an **average of \$1,000** to divert a family from becoming homeless.

This is a fraction of Rapid Re-housing + Shelter Costs



## What can Diversion Look Like?



- Returning to Friends and Family
- ★ Re-entering a Previous Residence
- + Temporary Diversion while Seeking New Housing
- → Relocating to a Safe Place out of Town

#### What do these costs look like?

Many Diversions require no additional costs (About a third).

#### Through:

- Mediation Phone Calls with Families
- Connections to Services offered in your community (such as food pantries, job training programs, or childcare assistance)
- Empowering them to believe they can maintain housing. Hope Matters.

### **Diversion through Small Costs**

Small Costs Costs can include things like, cell phone assistance, food assistance or a shared meal, transportation assistance.

#### Be Creative!

Diversions have been done with sewing machines, dressers, and pre-paid phones. The key is to listen and keep an open mind and have small flexible funding for your client's needs.

## **Diversion Program Costs**

Shelter Diversion seeks to align incentives in the housing system and get people housed as quickly as possible.

Shelter Diversion funding includes assistance with limited backrent or a security deposit & first month's rent without any income or housing history requirement if this will help them to stay permanently housed.

#### What about Returns to Homelessness?

We have found that those who are diverted largely do not return to homelessness.

In an early analysis, CT found that 90% of families & 87% of individuals diverted did not return to seek shelter in 2016

For that 10-13%, try Diversion again, work toward Rapid-ReHousing & move to Progressive Engagement model or increasing support as needed.




Diversion can fit in to any Housing First Assistance System.

#### Where do they get funding?


Mixed! Most funding comes from philanthropy & grants.
