In 2017 City Council Allocated \$1.5 million x 3 years = \$4.5 million. Created a Homelessness Program Director Position Set to work on allocating some of the designated funds. Then asked, what happens at the end of 2018?

All partner organizations also receive funding from diverse sources such as:

SAMHSA, MDHI/HUD, Private Foundations, Medicaid Reimbursement, etc.

Due to Council advocacy, the marijuana industry agreed to a 2% raise in taxes to support the City's Homelessness Program

The increased 2% was effective 7/1/17

House Aurora Partnership

Rapid Re-Housing and Rapid ReHousing "Light"

- Individual or family is experiencing homelessness by either HUD or HRSA definition (which includes motels and doubled up)
- Household has income to maintain housing
- Support with application fees, deposit and 1st month's rent
- RRH "Light" short-term support from local service providers
- RRH HAP State ESG Funds were awarded with HAP funds as rental assistance

Eviction Prevention

- Documented 3-day notice or formal eviction paperwork
- Support with rent arrears
- Flexible assistance with other barriers to housing stabilization

Diversion

- Support in finding alternative solutions to entering the homeless services system.
- Tickets home to another state or city where an individual or family wishes to go and they have stable housing and work available (when appropriate).
- Family reunification
